Classical music will engage if it's fun: Grammy winner

Gurgaon: On Gandhi Jayanti, Delhi's Lotus Temple came to life as it hosted an opera based on the poignant tale of Shakuntala. This production, closing the circle of Franz Schubert's unfinished creation of the ear ly 19th century, is a labour of love of Grammy winning com-poser Gerald Wirth, and features Kathak dancer Shovana Narayan and an Indian choir rendering Gregorian chants.

On Monday at a workshop in the city's Rabindranath World School, Wirth -- artistic director of the Vienna Boys Choir - introduced a method that carries his name, a fresh and integrative approach to le-arning music. According to this Austrian's philosophy, everychildcansing, and everyperson in the world is a musical






SPORTS ACHIEVEMENTS

The event left thrilling memories and cherished moments in the hearts of each and every one present there.

























A BOX FULL OF KISSES




COMEDY OF ERRORS


Model United Nations (MUN-2018)






DIWALI CELEBRATION



A leader is not born but made by the experiences of life.





THE STORY OF MY LIFE

Hello everybody, you all must have seen me in school using a walking stick for my movement. Many of you must have been curious, as to what is my problem? Why I am unable to walk and run freely, like all others? Even my speech is slurred and I can't speak fluently! When all other children run & play, I only sit and enjoy their games. My walking stick is my best companion. So dear friends, let me brief you about myself. I am suffering from *Cerebral Palsy* (CP - in short). CP is a term used to describe a set of neurological conditions that affect movement.

The condition makes it hard to move certain parts of the body. There are many degrees of severity. But by God's grace, I really feel blessed to have wonderful, cooperative and loving parents. At an early stage, when my twin brother started making crawling movements and I couldn't, my mother became worried. We visited the doctor, and my parents staggered, when I was diagnosed with CP.

Thereafter, I had been undergoing physiotherapies. Initially, my parents used to be sad at my condition, but they thanked God that I am still better than many other cases they saw at the hospitals. I was always loved and cared, more than my brother. My mother used to say, that because of my twin brother, I learnt to fight – my grip became stronger. My desire to match my brother's actions kept me motivated always.





When I grew up, I attended play school with my brother. Later on, my parents faced too much problem for my admission, as they didn't want me to join special school. I gave many interviews in different schools, but got rejected as those schools didn't have facilities / staff to take care of special children. That time, my mother used to cry – I understood and made myself stronger everyday. Then one day, we reached this school (Tagore International School, that time) and met the Principal. After the interview, I got selected. My parents rejoiced and I felt the happiness within me.

I had a pick-drop facility by the school bus. I was helped and escorted to class everyday throughout. I am not only taken care of by my classmates, but also by my Principal, Vice Principal & teachers. I was always helped by my friends, bus conductors and all other school staff. My teachers have not only cooperated with me in a loving way but also maintained strictness, so that I could attend homework, studies and academics like other students. My parents always shared with friends/relatives, that without the blessings of God, I couldn't have got better care and education than RWS. This school has always encouraged me to participate in all the activities and with time, I grew up to be more confident. I am blessed to have very caring parents and would like to dedicate the following lines to them:

BHOOT CHATURDASHI

The day before Diwali is celebrated as the Bhoot Chaturdashi in Bengal. We had been living in Gurgaon for around 15 years .Though we lived in Gurgaon, we hadn't forgotten our tradition and so, just a day before Diwali, we were celebrating Bhoot Chaturdashi. On this day, it is believed that the spirits of our forefathers and those who are dead, visit the land of mortals and roam around the streets. Now, I am going to tell a true incident of what happened on this particular day and made me believe in all the rituals of the day. During the course of two to three years, I had put on some weight. I didn't care about it till the time came when my clothes started protesting and demanded some room to breathe. So I took up running. At first, I tried in the early morning but that never worked out. So I started running during the evenings. I usually did two rounds around the ground. The ground was quite big. One round about it meant 600 meters. So two meant 1200 meters, this was quite enough for me. I had been losing weight at a steady pace. On this particular day, at about 4:45 in the evening, I dressed up and started for the ground.

The ground was barely a kilometre away. In order to get there, one had to cross through the metro station and get on to the adjacent path. The ground was rather empty that day. Usually around this time a lot of people could be seen. I kind of ignored it and started my usual rounds. I was feeling good and suddenly I stopped! Yes, just stopped. I didn't feel like running any more. It felt a bit awkward; I decided to sit under one of the metro pillars. So I walked up to one of them and having assured that the place was clean, sat there. For some time I reflected upon my inability to run and then my thoughts ran through a trillion things.

From the spot where I was sitting, I could command a good view of the whole ground and also of the newly built foot-over bridge. As my eyes ran up and down the ground, my gaze was suddenly fixed upon a group of people, who had gathered near the lift of the bridge. Something had happened, I wondered what! I had not come by the usual path, but rather had taken a longer one that bypassed the bridge and reached the ground.

Maybe 15 minutes elapsed before I saw an ambulance rush down the path. And then another 15 minutes later, I saw a boy of nearly my age but of a rather lean built come down the path, heading towards me. As he came nearer, I observed his dress. He was wearing a track pant and a cotton T-shirt and his feet were adorned with sports shoes. I quickly concluded him to be a fellow runner. He approached me and greeted by saying, "Hello, my name's John, what's yours?" I answered him accordingly and we soon fell into a conversation. He told me he was from Austria and was in India for a vacation and that constant travel had made him dizzy and thus he decided to get into the runner's outfit and move out to breathe some fresh air. I told him about myself, my friends, family and a dozen other odd things.

We talked about things and sequentially came on to Diwali. My Austrian friend wanted to know about this festival. I told him the day's significance, why it was celebrated. Then he asked, "Say man, what's this Bhoot Chaturdashi?

I was in Kolkata the other day and people there were talking about it. Do you know anything?". So I explained to him this also, and the facts that have been already mentioned. At the end of my narrative, he said that it was like Halloween, but a good deal different at the same time. I agreed.

We had been talking for a while now and as I glanced at my watch, I gave a brief cry. It was 6:30 and I was supposed to get back by 5:30. I conveyed the same to my friend, and he also was supposed to return by 5:30. We bade good bye to each other and shook hands.

His hands felt unnaturally cold and for the first time, I noticed his eyes. They were brighter than they should have been and I could literally see through him (it seemed though). Well, of-course I ignored all this at the time and concluded that I was reading too much of the supernatural, and turned and went my way. As I approached the bridge, I noticed that there had been an accident. I did see a body lying there, covered with a white cloth, but having nerves of an alloy (if not steel) moved on and reached home. At home, the day's usual rituals were followed and then around

The following day, I got up a bit later than usual, brushed my teeth and came down and took a seat by the divan and with a cup of tea in the hand, took the newspaper from my grandmother and opened it.
