Artist Jagmohan Bangani is a freelance artist from Uttarakhand settled in Delhi since 2000. He received master degree (Painting) from Winchester School of Art, Winchester, UK. Bangani is a recipient of Ford Foundation Fellowship (New York), Junior Fellowship (Ministry of Culture, the Government of India), Research Scholarship (Lalit Kala Akademi, New Delhi), and Uttarakhand State Award from AIFACS New Delhi. So far, Bangani has done six solo shows including Visual Scriptures (2017), Scriptural Enchantment (2011), Texts, Words & Scripts (2010), Tapestry of Words (2008), Shabd- Nishabd (2007) and Early Memories (2004). His works are exhibited in a number of major group art exhibitions in India and abroad including Asian Art Show (2014), 4 Visual Paths (2013), Exploring the Visual (2012), Urban Maze (2011), Pop- Up Art (2010), Symphony of Art & Music (2009), Ananya (2008), Childhood Memories (2007), Collective Spaces (2006), Livable Art the Silent Moment (2005). He has participated a number of art fairs, art camps and residencies in India and abroad. Bangani's art works are in collection with Secretariat Uttarakhand State (Dehradun), Lalit Kala Akademi, the Ford Foundation, Maxmular Bhawan, Asian Heritage Foundation etc.

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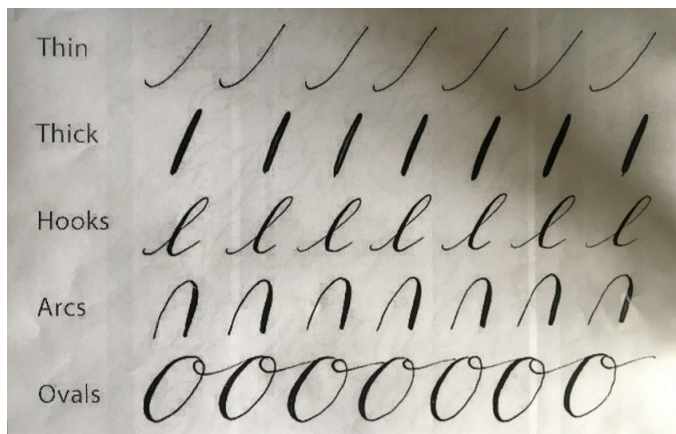

Exercises practiced by the students.



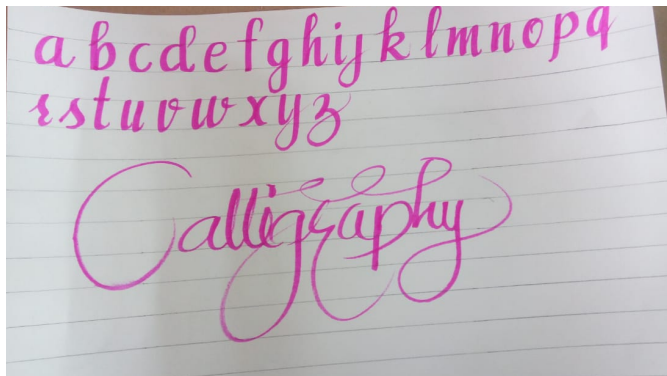
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Hands-on exercises helped students to learn the art of calligraphy.

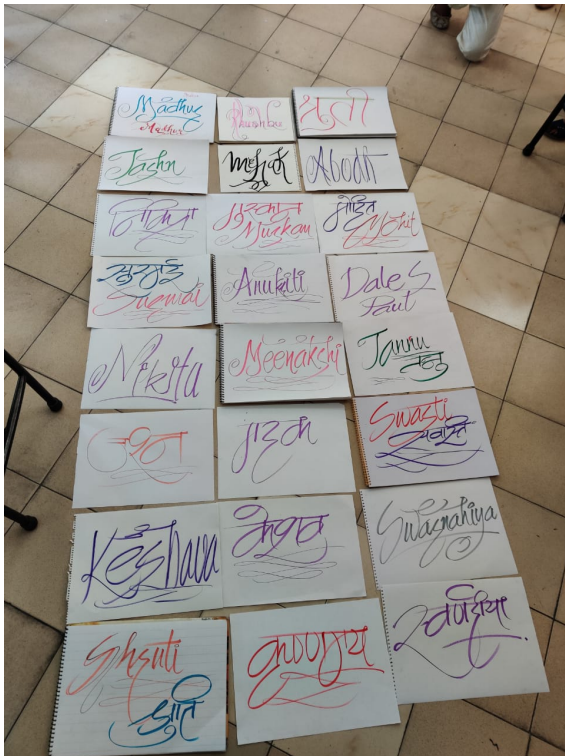

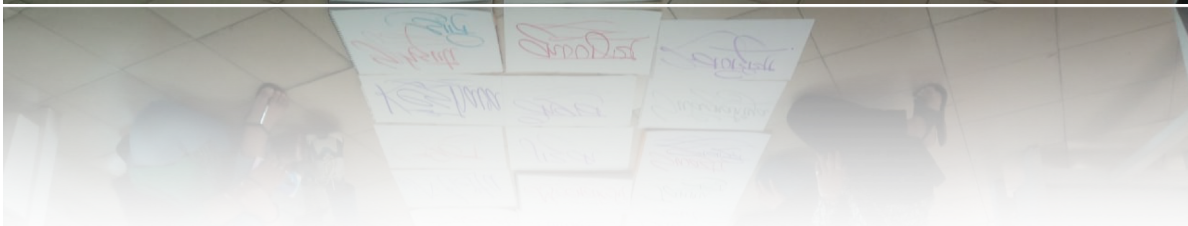
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Overall the whole session was quite interactive wherein students participated actively in all the exercises given to them. Hence it was a great learning experience for all.
